KEYNOTE PRESENTATIONS

Confident Pluralism

JOHN D. INAZU, WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY IN ST. LOUIS

This talk analyzes the current state of the country, orients the contemporary United States within its broader history, and explores the ways that Americans can—and must—strive to live together peaceably despite our deeply engrained differences. Pluralism is one of the founding creeds of the United States—yet America's society and legal system continue to face deep, unsolved structural problems in dealing with differing cultural anxieties and viewpoints. Inazu not only argues that it is possible to cohabitate peacefully but also lays out realistic guidelines for our society, schools, and legal system to achieve the new American dream through civic practices that value toleration over protest, humility over defensiveness, and persuasion over coercion.



JOHN D. INAZU is the Sally D. Danforth Distinguished Professor of Law and Religion and Professor of Political Science at Washington University in St. Louis. He teaches criminal law, law and religion, and various First Amendment seminars. His scholarship focuses on the First Amendment freedoms of speech, assembly, and religion and related questions of legal and political theory. His first book, Liberty's Refuge: The Forgotten Freedom of Assembly, was published by Yale University Press in 2012. His second book, Confident Pluralism: Surviving and Thriving Through Deep Difference, was published by the University of Chicago Press in 2016. He has written broadly

for mainstream audiences in publications including USA Today, The Los Angeles Times, and The Washington Post.

From Apartheid to Inclusion: Regaining Dignity Through Education

TEMBA T. MAQUBELA, GROTON SCHOOL (MA)

The symbiotic relationship between diversity and inclusion comes to life through Maqubela's personal story—from his persecution and exile for anti-apartheid activism in his native South Africa to his role as eighth headmaster of one of America's most admired independent schools. Maqubela landed in New York as a refugee, spent his first nights in a homeless shelter with his wife and infant son, and ultimately began his teaching career in America in Queens, New York. Influenced by the wisdom of Nelson Mandela and esteemed educators in their own families, he and his wife, Vuyelwa, relied on their roles as educators to lift up their family and reassert their dignity.



TEMBA T. MAQUBELA became Groton School's (MA) headmaster on July 1, 2013. Prior to Groton, Maqubela spent nearly three decades at Phillips Academy, Andover (MA) serving as teacher, department chair, director of a math and science program for minority students, dean of faculty, and assistant head of academics. Maqubela was born in a small city in South Africa. He attended high school until a few weeks before his intended graduation in 1976, when he was arrested—while in his mother's biology class—and detained for anti-apartheid activities. Later that year, he fled South Africa and ultimately finished high school in Nigeria. He graduated with honors from Nigeria's

University of Ibadan, earning a bachelor's degree in chemistry. He later earned a master's in chemistry at the University of Kentucky. Among Maqubela's many honors are the Desmond Tutu Social Justice Award, a White House Distinguished Teacher Award, and induction into the Northeast Section of the American Chemical Society's Aula Laudis Society.

An Inside-Out Approach to School Safety

Without a comprehensive security plan, schools remain vulnerable to crimes committed by trusted insiders. Many of today's threats, including cyber attacks and violent intruders, are masterminded by those with access to school networks and facilities. Security strategies that integrate countermeasures are key to intervention, detection, and prevention. By taking an inside-out approach, schools will be better equipped to identify potential threats and intervene earlier in the incident cycle, before a situation escalates into a full-scale emergency.


