#### Dyslexia is:

A specific learning disability that is neurobiological in origin. It is characterized by difficulties with accurate and/or fluent word recognition and by poor spelling and decoding abilities. These difficulties typically result from a deficit in the phonological component of language that is often unexpected in relation to other cognitive abilities and the provision of effective instruction. Secondary consequences may include problems in reading comprehension and reduced reading experience that can impede growth of vocabulary and background knowledge. (Lyon, Shaywitz, & Shaywitz, 2003, p.2)

## The student with dyslexia:

- No two are alike
- Differences in severity
- Coexisting conditions with other types of problems such as anxiety or attention
- Coexisting strengths, or areas of talent and interest that enable a person to do well in life. They excel in careers such as architects, engineers, artists, inventors, entrepreneurs, actors, and athletes.

#### Why the need?

- 15-20% of the population has a learning difference
- 80% of the students with LD have their problems in reading
- 74% of the children identified in third grade remain disabled in

9th grade if they do not receive intervention

• These students are in your schools

#### School within a school model

- Provides educational services to students' language based learning differences and attention issues
- Students attend core classes in The Learning Center
- Specials classes (art, music, and PE) are attended with same age peers
- Lunch and recess with same age peers

#### **Effective Programs**

- High Intensity
- Small group instruction
- Styles of teaching matters
- Highly Skilled Teachers

- Tuition-\$1,800.00/teacher
- Practicum Fee-\$500.00/teacher
- ALTA Exam Fee--\$120.00/teacher
- Lodging and meals--\$1,800.00/teacher
- Subsequent Training
  - In-house w/ Instructor from The Key School
  - 2012-Basic Training \$18,000.00
  - 2014-Advanced \$8,000.00

- Students generally transition back to regular classroom after 3 years of instruction
- Gains are sustained and progress continues at an average rate
- Students become independent learners

#### How did we get started?

 Identified Orton-Gillingham trained teacher to share the vision for a stronger learning community.

- Visited Jane and Chuck at The Lexington School.
- Began assessing students to determine our needs.
- Had teachers who showed some interest shadow our director for a day.
- Talked with local parochial schools to determine their need/interest.
- Identified current teachers and new hires to identify best OG mentors.
- Set up two-year pilot with limited grant money (\$35,000/year)

Start with Why – why are you considering this?
 "to create change that lasts, we need to know what we stand for"

#### For us...

- o Reinvigorated our faculty with purpose.
- Allowed us to be a private school with public purpose serving other schools.
- Received IDA accreditation as clinical site for West Liberty University
  Reading program one of 25 such accredited programs in the country.
- Begin listening to teachers discuss a bright student's need
  - o to repeat a grade,
  - o to work harder
  - o to check his spelling, math, etc.
  - o to get organized
- Find out what resources are available to your families.
