How To Unleash Your Child's Brilliance - Even in a Smart But Scattered: How Parents Can Help Strengthen Executive Skills in Their Children PEG DAWSON, PSYCHOLOGIST & AUTHOR

> Executive skills are critical to the acquisition of academic skills, but, more importantly, they are the skills students need to get things done. They are brain-based skills such as task initiation, sustained attention, working memory, planning, organization, and goal-directed persistence that are critical to school success. Some students seem to acquire them naturally, but many students struggle. Dr. Peg Dawson, co-author of the books Smart but Scattered and Smart but Scattered Teens, will describe how these skills develop throughout childhood and will suggest strategies parents can use to help children acquire the critical skills they need to be successful students. This webinar is for parents of children in grades K-12.



PEG DAWSON has over 40 years of clinical practice experience and has worked with thousands of children and teens who struggle at home and in school, often attributable to weak executive skills. Along with Dr. Richard Guare, she has

written numerous books on this topic for educators, mental health professionals, and parents, among them Smart but Scattered, Smart but Scattered Teens, Executive Skills in Children and Adolescents, and Coaching Students with Executive Skills Deficits. Dawson also is a past president of the National Association of School Psychologists and the International School Psychology Association, and is a recipient of NASP's Lifetime Achievement Award.

How Does Play Promote Children's Social, Emotional & Intellectual Development?

PETER GRAY, RESEARCH PROFESSOR OF PSYCHOLOGY & NEUROSCIENCE AT BOSTON COLLEGE

"Play" is a word that is used to refer to children's preferred activities. But what, really, is play? Hear the definition of play as activity and learn about the characteristics of play and how each of them contributes to play's educational and developmental value. Learn why play came about—to promote children's healthy physical, intellectual, social, moral, and emotional growth—and how psychological detriments have accompanied the decline of play in recent decades. This webinar is for parents and caregivers of children birth-age 14.



PETER GRAY is a research professor of psychology and neuroscience at Boston College. He has conducted and published research in neuroendocrinology, developmental psychology, anthropology, and education.

His recent research focuses on the role of play in human evolution and how children educate themselves through play and exploration—when they are free to do so. He expanded on these ideas in his book, *Free to Learn: Why Unleashing the Instinct to Play Will Make Our Children Happier, More Self-Reliant, and Better Students for Life.* He also authors a regular blog called *Freedom to Learn* for *Psychology Today* magazine.

Parents of high-ability children often find that they are struggling to keep up with the whirlwind of their children's interests and passions. CAROL SUTTON LEWIS, GROUND CONTROL PARENTING

How can parents of children of color help them successfully navigate their independent school experience? What can we do to support their academic, social, and emotional growth in school and beyond? Parent advocate Carol Sutton Lewis is the founder of Ground Control Parenting and host of the *Ground Control Parenting* podcast. She draws upon her extensive experience with independent schools and parenting to offer tips and advice on how parents can help their children manage the opportunities and challenges that an educational experience in independent school can present. While this discussion will be of particular interest to parents and caregivers of children of color, all are welcome to join.



CAROL SUTTON LEWIS, a trained attorney, has spent over 25 years focusing on parenting, child development, and education, with a particular interest in how Black and Brown children learn and develop. She shares best parenting

practices in her blog, *Ground Control Parenting* and produces a weekly *Ground Control Parenting with Carol Sutton Lewis* podcast where she talks with experts about the job and the joy of raising Black and Brown children. Sutton Lewis serves on the board of Stanford Law School and is on the New York City Advisory Council and the Editorial Advisory Board of Common Sense Media. She has previously served on the boards of the University of Pennsylvania School of Arts and Sciences and her sons' K-12 independent school in New York City.
